The unity of the church is the gift of the Spirit and a task of the church. We hereby CALL INTO COVENANT our respective Synods, Dioceses and Conferences and COMMIT OURSELVES to the following actions. In behalf of the unity of the church, WE WILL:

- pray for each other, particularly at the principal Sunday celebration;
- sponsor seasonal prayer services, especially during the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity;
- 3. encourage shared lectionary studies;
- promote pulpit exchanges in accord with the respective guidelines of each tradition;
- encourage cooperation among member churches in providing premarital preparation for ecumenical marriages;
- encourage shared religious formational and educational events, e.g. youth ministry, vacation Bible school, living room dialogue;
- 7. develop joint efforts in evangelism and social justice;
- develop covenants among our congregations, institutions and chaplaincies;
- support statewide, regional and local LARCUM Conferences, and establish annuallya joint meeting of our ecumenical bodies;
- encourage each diocese and synod to develop supportive prayer services and covenanting models for its congregations through their respective ecumenical and liturgical committees;
- urge congregations to study the existing dialogues among our churches;
- 12. develop covenants among schools and academies for shared programs;
- ask congregations to develop and reflect on their cooperative ministries to discover areas of convergence among our four churches;
- sponsor shared retreats and formational events for clergy and parish leadership;
- 15. develop campus ministry covenants among Catholic Campus Ministry, Canterbury Association, Lutheran Student Union, and Wesley Foundation, and support covenants at existing ecumenical ministries and with college chaplains;
- 16. seek ways to coordinate program and planning at the district/synodical/diocesan/conference level;
- collaborate at the judicatory level on justice issues and social concerns;
- review and evaluate this Covenant annually at a meeting of the state LARCUM Committee representatives with Bishops;
- establish goals annually which advance this Covenant;
- 20. celebrate the renewal of this Covenant annually at the statewide LARCUM conference.

May the Holy Spirit, who has brought us to this moment of covenanting, bring us to ever deepening levels of unity. To this end we affix our names and recommend it to our respective judicatories, this 1st day of December, 2006.



**THE REV. DR. GERALD CHRISTIANSON** was ordained by the Augustana Lutheran Church at Rock Island, Illinois, on June 12, 1960, and married Carol Berg the following Saturday. Dr. Christianson is Emeritus Professor of Church History at Gettysburg Lutheran Seminary where he taught early and medieval church



history from 1967 until January, 2010 which is thought to be the longest tenure in the seminary's history. He also served as visiting professor at Lancaster Theological Seminary and Yale Divinity School. Born in Duluth, Minnesota on November 19, 1933, he received his education at Gustavus Adolphus College, Augustana Theological Seminary and the University of Chicago, with further study at the University of Geneva.

Dr. Christianson served as pastor of Resurrection Lutheran Church in Gary, Indiana, from 1960-1963, and as visiting pastor in Ault, Colorado and Brussels, Belgium. He has remained active in the seminary, synod, community, and congregation. In 1980 he founded Music, Gettysburg!, a musical series formed by a partnership between the seminary and the community. Since 1976 he has hosted the weekly public affairs program, "The Seminary Explores," first heard over radio stations WGET and WGTY and now podcast on the seminary website. He serves on the board of the Seminary Ridge Preservation Foundation and was a member of the Design Committee for the new Gettysburg Seminary Ridge Museum from its beginning to its completion.

For the synod, he served on Key '73, the Program Committee for the Synod Assembly, and the Taskforce on Children's Communion. He has preached and lectured widely in the synods of Maryland, central and western Pennsylvania, and is an active member of St. James, Gettysburg, where he chaired the Organ and Worship Area Sub-Committee after the church burned in 1969, and again chaired the Worship Area Renewal Committee which completed a renovation in 2014.

In 1990 he received the Salute to Teaching award from the Pennsylvania Academy for the Profession of Teaching and in 1995 the Distinguished Alumni Citation from Gustavus Adolphus College. He founded the International Seminar on Pre-Reformation Theology at Gettysburg Seminary and since 1986 has chaired its biennial Gettysburg Conference. He is the author, co-author, or co-editor of several books, most recently a collection of essays, Reform, Representation and Theology (2011) for which a review in Renaissance Quarterly said, "Remarkable for their clarity of expression and balanced judgment in weighing the historical evidence, these essays surely establish themselves as among the best work on the Council of Basel in the late twentieth century."

He and his wife Carol have two children and four grandchildren.
